

SF State Probation Study

Fall Cohorts of 2007 through 2009
First-Time Freshmen and
New Transfer Students

February 2013

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Executive Summary

This study examined the incidence and likelihood of being placed on academic probation and the subsequent academic status and outcomes of students who were placed on probation. Students included in this study were 10,991 first-time freshmen (FTF) and 8,910 new transfer students who matriculated in the Fall terms of 2007 through 2009.

- 22% of the FTF and 18% of the new transfer students were placed on probation for at least one term during the time period studied.
- 14% of FTF and 12% of transfer students were placed on probation in Term 1. Fewer, 4% of FTF and 3% of transfer students, were first placed on probation in Term 2.
- Characteristics of FTF who were significantly more likely than were others to be placed on probation:
 - o Male
 - o Black/African American or Latino
 - URM
 - First generation college
 - Enrolled in EOP
 - o Pell-eligible
 - o Enrolled part-time in Term 1
 - Needed remediation in both English and math
 - High school GPA of "B" or "C"
- Characteristics of new transfer students who were significantly more likely than were others to be placed on probation:
 - o 23 or 24 years of age
 - Male
 - Asian, Black/African American, or Latino
 - URM
 - Pell-eligible
 - Business or Science & Engineering majors
 - Enrolled part-time in Term 1
 - Transfer GPA of "C"
- Among all students, those enrolled part-time in Term 1 (3% of FTF and 22% of transfer students) were significantly more likely than were full-time students to be placed on probation. While 21% of FTF and 16% of transfer students who were enrolled full-time in Term 1 were ever placed on probation, 40% of FTF and 23% of transfer students who were enrolled part-time in Term 1 were placed on probation.

- Black/African American FTF (36%) were much more likely and Latino FTF (26%) somewhat more likely to be placed on probation than were Asian (21%) or White (18%) FTF.
- Compared to other terms, the largest numbers of students on probation or subject to disqualification dropped out of SF State between Terms 2 and 3. 52% of FTF and 38% of transfer students who were placed on probation in Term 1 dropped out by Term 3.
- Disqualification occurred at the end of Terms 3 and 4 and involved roughly 1% of all students.
- Of all Fall 2007 students, 16% of the FTF and 9% of the transfer students were placed on probation (but not disqualified) and dropped out of SF State within four years.
- Among students who had been on probation but not disqualified, 67% of FTF and 50% of transfer students dropped out within four years.
- Only 1% of FTF from Fall 2007 who were placed on probation *graduated* from SF State within four years.
- In contrast, 30% of the transfer students from Fall 2007 who were placed on probation graduated from SF State within four years of matriculation, although it should be noted that 98% of the new transfer students were upper division students.
- 72% of the Fall 2007 FTF who were placed on probation and left SF State without graduating by Fall 2011 continued their secondary education at another institution. None, however, earned an associate's degree, and only two earned a bachelor's degree by Fall 2011.
- 65% of the Fall 2007 new transfer students who were placed on probation and left SF State without graduating in four years continued their education elsewhere. Only five, however, graduated with a two-year degree, and only six graduated with a four-year degree.

Introduction

This study looks at probation among students from the Fall cohorts of 2007 through 2009. Statistically significant differences in the incidence and likelihood of being placed on probation by demographic characteristics are described. In addition, academic performance metrics, subsequent academic status, and outcomes of students who were placed on probation are provided, including information about if and where non-graduating students who were on probation continued their higher education after leaving SF State.

Students in the Study

The students included in this study were 10,991 first-time freshmen (FTF) and 8,910 new transfer students enrolled in the Fall terms of 2007 through 2009. Students excluded from this study were the 1.0% of all FTF and 1.5% of all new transfer students who withdrew from all of their courses in the first term. The distribution of demographic characteristics among the students in this study was representative of that among all FTF and new transfer students enrolled at SF State during the terms included in this study.

SF State Probation Policy

Students are placed on probation when their campus (SF State) and/or total (from all colleges/universities attended) GPA falls below 2.0. Students on probation for two consecutive semesters with very low GPAs are subject to disqualification (at or below 1.50 for freshmen, 1.70 for sophomores, 1.85 for juniors, and 1.95 for seniors). Students on probation or subject to disqualification are not permitted to enroll in classes for the next term until they have met with their major advisor and completed the department's reinstatement process. Then they are permitted to enroll in 13 or fewer units during the next term. Disqualified students must make up their academic deficiencies through College of Extended Learning (CEL) coursework within two terms of being disqualified in order to be eligible for reinstatement.

Incidence of Probation

One in five (22%) of the FTF from the Fall terms of 2007 through 2009 were placed on probation at least once during their enrollment at SF State. Term 1 was when the students (14% of FTF) were most frequently placed on probation, followed by 4% first placed on probation in Term 2.

A slightly smaller percentage (18%) of new transfer students from the Fall terms of 2007 through 2009 were placed on probation. Again, Term 1 was when the transfer students (12%) were most frequently placed on probation, followed by 3% first placed on probation in Term 2.

Disqualification occurred at the end of the third and fourth terms and affected about 1% of students.

Likelihood of Probation

The likelihood of being placed on probation was examined by demographic and academic characteristics. The factors that were significantly related to FTF and transfer students being placed on probation and the percentages placed on probation are shown in the tables below.

Among all students, those enrolled part-time in Term 1 (3% of FTF and 22% of transfer students) were significantly more likely than were those enrolled full-time to be placed on probation. While 21% of FTF and 16% of transfer students who were enrolled full-time in Term 1 were ever placed on probation, 40% of FTF and 23% of transfer students who were enrolled part-time in Term 1 were placed on probation at some point. Although greater percentages of part-time FTF than part-time transfer students were placed on probation, the impact was greater among transfer students than among FTF because a greater percentage of transfer students (22% vs. 3% of FTF) were enrolled part-time. Another notable difference is between Black/African American FTF and others. Black/African American FTF were much more likely and Latino FTF (26%) somewhat more likely to be placed on probation (36%) than were Asian (21%) or White (18%) FTF. This difference was much more muted among transfer students.

Two or More Consecutive Terms on Probation

Among all of the students in the study, 12% of FTF and 10% of new transfer students were, at least once, on probation for at least two consecutive terms. Among only the new transfer students who had been on probation, those with transfer GPAs of "C" were significantly more likely than were those with higher transfer GPAs to be on probation or subject to disqualification for at least two consecutive semesters (64% of students with "C" transfer GPAs vs. 51% of those with "B" and 46% of those with "A" averages). No groups of FTF were more likely than were any others to be on probation for two or more consecutive terms.

Multiple Episodes of Probation

Only 2% of the FTF and 1% of the transfer students had multiple episodes of probation, i.e., were on probation, subject to disqualification, or disqualified at least twice, with a period of good standing in between. The likelihood of having multiple episodes of probation did not differ significantly between most groups of students. Remediated FTF, however, were significantly more likely than were those who did not need remediation to have multiple episodes of probation. (They were also significantly more likely than were those who did not complete remediation to have multiple episodes of probation, but there were only 10 students who did not complete remediation who were subsequently enrolled at SF State.)

Academic Performance by Academic Status

As would be expected, FTF and new transfer students in good standing at the end of Term 1 attempted and earned more units and had higher GPAs than did students placed on probation at the end of Term 1. The tables below permit comparisons within and between FTF and new transfer student groups. Of note is the extent to which the students on probation underperformed, completing only two thirds of the units they attempted, compared to the completion of nearly all of the units attempted by those in good standing.



A similar pattern is seen below for the end of Term 2. Furthermore, among only the students on probation or subject to disqualification in Term 2, those who were already on probation in Term 1 attempted fewer units in Term 2 than did students who were newly on probation in Term 2. Yet those who began probation in Term 1 completed more units and achieved higher GPAs in Term 2 than did those whose probation began at the end of Term 2. This may be the result of effective mandatory advising of students placed on probation in their first term.



Changes in Academic Status after Being Placed on Probation

Students were more likely to be placed on probation in their first term than in any other term. The academic status of students through their second year is shown below for the Fall 2007 through 2009 students who were placed on probation in their first term. The most notable change in academic status took place between the second and third terms, when large percentages of students on probation or subject to disqualification left SF State.





In contrast to the FTF (above), roughly one third of the transfer students (below) who were on probation in Term 1 were able to move from probation in Term 2 to good standing in Term 3 instead of dropping out of SF State.



Similarly, there was some movement of FTF and new transfer students who were first put on probation in their *second* term, from probation in Term 3 to good standing in Term 4, as shown below.

Among the FTF, however, nearly half of the students who were first placed on probation in Term 2 were no longer enrolled in Term 3 (see Chart 3). In contrast, only 16% of the FTF placed on probation in Term 1 (see Chart 1) were not enrolled in their next term. This pattern was not as marked among transfer students.





In sum, transfer students were more likely to move from probation to good standing than were FTF.

Outcomes of Students Placed on Probation

Shown below are the four-year outcomes for the FTF from Fall 2007, grouped by the timing of their first term that resulted in being placed on probation.

Among the FTF who were placed on probation at some point, 70% left SF State (3% of those after being disqualified) and had not returned as of Spring 2011.

Below are shown the four-year outcomes of the transfer students from Fall 2007, similarly grouped by when they were placed on probation. Compared to the graduation of 2% or fewer of the FTF placed on probation, the graduation in four years of nearly one third of the transfer students placed on probation is quite notable, although it must be acknowledged that 98% of new transfer students were upper division students.

Among the Fall 2007 students who were placed on probation, the FTF who were placed on probation in Term 1 and the transfer students who were first placed on probation in Term 2 had the best outcomes, i.e., the highest four-year graduation and the lowest dropout rates.

Post-SF State Outcomes of Students Placed on Probation

Of the 581 FTF from Fall 2007 who were placed on probation and left SF State without graduating before Fall 2011, 420 (72%) continued their secondary education at another institution before Fall 2011, according to data from the National Student Clearinghouse. Most (88%) enrolled *first* in public two-year colleges. Nearly all (96%) enrolled in institutions in California. More than eight in ten (84%) were *last* enrolled in public two-year colleges before Fall 2011. Nearly all (94%) were last enrolled in institutions in California. Despite their high rate of continuing education, none graduated with a two-year degree, and only two graduated with a four-year degree.

Of the 313 transfer students from Fall 2007 who were placed on probation at some point and left SF State without graduating before Fall 2011, 203 (65%) continued their secondary education at another institution before Fall 2011, according to data from the National Student Clearinghouse. Most (68%) enrolled *first* in public two-year colleges; 25% first enrolled in four-year public institutions. Eight in ten (86%) enrolled in institutions in California. Six in ten (61%) were *last* enrolled in public two-year colleges before Fall 2011; 27% were last enrolled in public four-year institutions. Eight in ten (83%) were last enrolled in institutions in California. Again, although nearly two thirds continued their higher education, only five graduated with a two-year degree, and only six graduated with a four-year degree, including four from other CSU campuses.

Conclusion

This study on the incidence, likelihood, and results of being placed on probation used academic and demographic data for the 10,991 first-time freshmen (FTF) and 8,910 new transfer students enrolled in the Fall terms of 2007 through 2009 who completed their first semester of SF State coursework.

Students are placed on probation when their campus and/or total GPA falls below 2.0. Students on probation for two consecutive semesters with very low GPAs are subject to disqualification. Students on probation or subject to disqualification are not permitted to enroll in classes for the next term until they have met with their major advisor and completed the department's reinstatement process. Then they are permitted to enroll in 13 or fewer units during the next term. Disqualified students must make up their academic deficiencies through CEL within two terms of being disqualified in order to be eligible for reinstatement.

One in five (22%) of the FTF and 18% of new transfer students from the Fall terms of 2007 through 2009 were placed on probation at least once during their enrollment at SF State. Students were most at risk of being placed on probation at the end of their first term, when 14% of FTF and 12% of transfer students were placed on probation. Fewer students (4% of FTF and 3% of transfer students) were first placed on probation in Term 2.

The likelihood of being placed on probation was examined by demographic characteristics. Among FTF, students who were significantly more likely than were others in each demographic or academic category to be placed on probation were male, Black/African American or Latino, URM students, first generation college, enrolled in EOP, eligible for Pell grants, enrolled part-time in Term 1, in need of remediation in both English and math, or those whose high school GPA was "B" or "C."

Among new transfer students, those who were significantly more likely than were others in each category to be placed on probation included students who were male, Black/African

American, Asian or Latino, URM students, Pell-eligible, those having Business or Science & Engineering majors, enrolled part-time in Term 1, and those with a "C" transfer GPA.

One of the most notable factors in the likelihood of being placed on probation is enrollment status. While only 21% of FTF and 16% of transfer students who were enrolled full-time in Term 1 were ever placed on probation, 40% of FTF and 23% of transfer students who were enrolled part-time in Term 1 were placed on probation.

Another notable factor was ethnicity among FTF. Black/African American FTF (36%) were much more likely and Latino FTF (26%) somewhat more likely to be placed on probation than were Asian (21%) or White (18%) FTF.

Twelve percent (12%) of FTF and 10% of new transfer students were, at least once, on probation for at least two consecutive terms. Only 2% of the FTF and 1% of the transfer students had multiple episodes of probation.

As would be expected, FTF and new transfer students in good standing at the end of Terms 1 and 2 attempted and earned more units and had higher GPAs than did students placed on probation at the end of those terms. Of note is the extent to which the students on probation underperformed, completing only two thirds of the units they attempted, compared to the completion of nearly all of the units attempted by those in good standing.


Among only the students on probation or subject to disqualification in Term 2, those who were already on probation in Term 1 attempted fewer but completed more units and achieved higher GPAs in Term 2 than did those whose probation began at the end of Term 2, possibly as a result of effective mandatory advising of students placed on probation in Term 1.


Subsequent academic status of those placed on probation was examined. The most notable change in the academic status of students who were placed on probation in Term 1 took place between the second and third terms, when nearly three times as many FTF and more than twice as many transfer students dropped out as had after Term 1. Unlike FTF, however, some transfer students placed on probation in Term 1 were able to move from probation to good standing between Terms 2 and 3, and a smaller percentage of transfer students than of FTF dropped out of SF State at that point.

Four-year outcomes for students placed on probation indicated that they were very unlikely to continue their enrollment at SF State and even more unlikely to graduate. Among all FTF from Fall 2007, for example, 24% were placed on probation at some point, and 17% left SF State without graduating. Among only those placed on probation, 67% dropped out, 3% left after being disqualified and did not return later to SF State, and only 1% graduated within four years.

Among all transfer students from Fall 2007, 18% were placed on probation, and 10% left without graduating. In contrast to the FTF, however, 30% of the transfer students who were placed on probation (6% of the Fall 2007 transfer cohort) graduated from SF State within four years of matriculation. It should be noted that 98% of the new transfer students were upper division students when they entered SF State.

While a greater percentage of transfer students graduated in four years compared to FTF (30% vs. 1%), the outcome for most students who were placed on probation was to drop out (50% of transfer students and 67% of FTF, not including the few who were disqualified). See Charts 5 and 6 below.





Data from the National Student Clearinghouse indicated that 72% of the Fall 2007 FTF who were placed on probation and left SF State without graduating before Fall 2011 continued their secondary education at another institution. None, however, earned an associate's degree, and only two earned a bachelor's degree before Fall 2011. Among the new transfer students of Fall 2007 who were placed on probation and left SF State, 65% continued their education elsewhere. Again, their graduation rates were low. Five graduated with a two-year degree. Six graduated with a four-year degree, including four from other CSU campuses.
