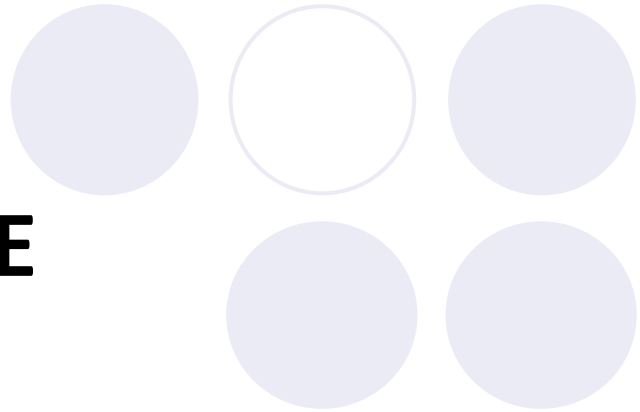

SF STATE – Student Pulse Survey

Introduction

The Student Pulse Survey questions are developed each semester by a group of staff and faculty representatives from different parts of campus to reflect current and ongoing student issues. The questions are finalized by Academic Institutional Research (AIR) in Academic Planning and Development and administered to students as part of the online course registration process. The student responses are analyzed by AIR. The following report presents the findings of the survey administered to students during Spring 2011.

Methods

Instrument

The instrument used for the survey was the SF State Student Pulse Survey, designed and modified over many years by personnel in AIR. The survey consists of 25 questions, of which a set of five is presented to each student. Please note that the first question of the survey was administered as the first question in three of the five sets of questions in order to obtain a larger sample. The SF State Student Pulse Survey questions and response options for Spring 2011 can be found in Appendix B.

Procedures

The administration of the Student Pulse Survey was conducted during Spring 2011 as part of the online course registration process. Students were presented one set of five questions based on the last digit of their student identification number. Students were able to skip any question(s) they did not want to answer.

AIR staff performed the data analysis, generating crosstabulations of survey question responses by demographic categories. Report results are based on the percentages and statistically significant standardized residuals found in the crosstabulations. Interpretations and conclusions drawn from the results of these data are limited to students who dropped or added courses in Spring 2011.

Summary of Findings

Student Life:

Most respondents indicated that they are satisfied with Student Life at SF State. Awareness of student events among respondents is generally mid-range between very aware and not at all aware. The type or topic of a Student Life event was reported as the most important factor considered in their decision to attend. Students are most likely to find out about events through email blasts, posted flyers, or social networking. The Monday/Tuesday/Wednesday response option was selected most frequently as the time of the week students would be most likely to attend an event. Most respondents reported a willingness to pay up to \$5 to attend.

SF State Community:

Strong student/faculty/staff relationships was the response most frequently chosen as the most important factor in defining a sense of community at SF State. Students most often responded that they do not feel connected with their college class identity. The Cesar Chavez Student Center was named by nearly two thirds of respondents as the place on campus where they feel most connected to the SF State community. More than two thirds of the respondents agree or strongly agree that the new Recreation and Wellness Center should provide a space for large campus-wide events such as lectures and concerts. Most respondents indicated that they would talk to a friend or family member if under stress on campus instead of contacting their academic advisor or a professor, the Counseling and Psychological Services Center, or a staff member (e.g., Resident Assistant).

Economic Recession:

Nearly 40% of respondents indicated that they are working more hours than before the economic recession. More than half indicated that they are taking the same number of classes as before. More than half reported that they are living in the same place as before. Most also responded that access to their professors has stayed the same, although most responded that the quality of their classes has declined somewhat as a result of the economic recession.

Pairing the responses for the questions about the number of hours worked and classes taken (n=4127 pairs) reveals:

- 16.8% working more hours and taking the same number of classes
- 16.1% not working and taking the same number of classes
- 14.6% working the same number of hours and taking the same number of classes
- 14.0% working more hours and taking fewer classes
- 8.8% working more hours and taking more classes

Pairing the responses for the questions about the quality of their classes and access to their professors (n=4195 pairs) shows:

- 27.0% feel both have stayed the same
- 19.9% feel both have declined somewhat
- 17.8% feel the quality of classes has declined somewhat while access to their professors has stayed the same

Demographic Characteristics of Respondents

All Respondents

Of the 28,177 students enrolled at SF State in Spring 2011, 27,052 students were provided the opportunity to respond to the survey. Of those students, 23,915 (88.4%) responded to the Student Pulse Survey.

Gender

Female students made up 60.5% (n=14477) of all respondents with male students making up 39.5% (n=9438).

Age

Students 24 years of age or younger made up 64.0% (n=15314) of all respondents while 36.0% (n=8601) of the respondents were 25 years of age or older. The range of student ages was from 17 to a maximum of 88 years. The mean was 25.0 years of age, and the standard deviation was 7.3. The mode or most frequent age of respondents was 19 years of age (12.1%, n=2891).

NOTE: In order to facilitate the analysis and presentation of data, age was grouped into two categories: 24 years of age or younger and 25 years of age or older. The SF State Reentry Admission Program uses 25 years of age and older as one of its criteria. Using this criterion in the analysis of survey data may permit differentiation between the responses of traditional and non-traditional students.

Ethnicity

Of the 23,915 survey respondents, ethnicity was available for 90.7% (n=21694). Of those for whom ethnicity was available 34.5% (n=7485) were White, 32.9% (n=7129) were Asian, 21.6% (n=4690) were Latino, 5.6% (n=1207) were African American, 4.3% (n=942) were of two or more non-Latino races, .7% (n=153) were Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, and .4% (n=88) were Native American or Alaskan Native.

NOTE: To facilitate the analysis and presentation of data, the race/ethnicity categories of the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) were used.

Class Level

Most of the respondents were seniors (45.5%, n=10870) followed by juniors (15.9%, n=3792) and graduate (15.6%, n=3722) students. Sophomores (12.9%, n=3096) and freshmen (10.2%, n=2435) made up 23.1% of all respondents.

NOTE: For the purposes of this report, the “graduate” category includes degree-seeking graduate students, non-degree seeking post-baccalaureate students, and students seeking a second baccalaureate degree.

College

Of all respondents, 20.3% (n=4845) were identified as students in the College of Business, 16.2% (n=3873) in the College of Behavioral and Social Sciences, 15.4% (n=3673) in the College of Health and Human Services students, 13.5% (n=3236) in the College of Science and Engineering, 11.6% (n=2770) in the College of Humanities, 10.2% (n=2443) in the College of Creative Arts, 7.6% (n=1817) as Other (“All University,” undecided, Liberal Studies, special major, exchange, etc.) students, 4.4% (n=1055) in the College of Education, and .8% (n=203) in the College of Ethnic Studies.

Overlap of Demographic Categories

There is overlap between some of the demographic categories that should be kept in mind when considering the results of the survey. Most respondents 24 years of age or younger were female (62.3%). Most graduate respondents (90.7%) were 25 years of age or older while most freshman (99.4%) and sophomore (99.6%) respondents were 24 years of age or younger. Half of the graduate respondents were White (50.8%). Most of the respondents from the College of Education (76.2%) were female as were most of the respondents from the College of Health and Human Services (79.3%). More than half (53.0%) of the respondents from the College of Business were Asian, and half of the respondents from the College of Education (50.5%) and the College of Creative Arts (48.7%) were White. Most respondents from the College of Education were graduate students (91.5%).

Overall Summary

More than two thirds of survey respondents reported living in San Francisco with more than half of those living off campus. Nearly half of the respondents chose strong student/faculty/staff relationships as most important to them in defining a sense of community at SF State. The Cesar Chavez Student Center was selected by the most respondents as the place on campus that they feel most connected. Most respondents indicated that they are working more hours than before the economic recession, and most respondents reported taking the same number of classes and living in the same place as before the recession. Most respondents indicated that the quality of their classes has declined somewhat while indicating that access to their professors has stayed the same.

Results by Question

Questions 1, 6 and 11 - “How far do you live from campus?”

Most respondents indicated that they live off campus within 1-4 miles (39.8%), followed by 29.6% indicating that they live outside of San Francisco. This was true of both male and female respondents. Most respondents 24 years of age or younger indicated that they live off campus 1-4 miles (44.8%) while most respondents 25 years of age or older indicated that they live outside of San Francisco (40.9%). The percent of respondents reporting that they live on campus decreased as class level increased with 41.1% of freshmen respondents indicating that they live on campus decreasing to 2.1% of graduate students. Most sophomore, junior, and senior respondents indicated that they live off campus within 1-4 miles. Most graduate respondents indicated that they live outside of San Francisco (41.1%). Fewer than half of the respondents in every ethnicity category reported living outside of San Francisco.

Question 2 - “What aspect is most critical when considering attending a Student Life event?”

Most respondents indicated that the type or topic of an event is most critical to their decision to attend. Most respondents 25 years of age or older indicated that the timing of the event is the most important consideration. Location was selected by a larger percentage of respondents from the College of Business than from other colleges.

Question 3 - “Where are you most likely to find out about a Student Life event?”

Email blast, a posted flyer, and social networking were named by most respondents as the ways they would find out about events. Most freshman respondents favored posted flyers while sophomore respondents preferred social networking. Most graduate respondents and respondents 25 years of age or older selected email blasts. Most respondents 24 years of age or younger reported that social networking is their most likely source of information about Student Life events. Graduate respondents were more likely than respondents at other class levels to indicate that they would find out from University staff/faculty. The University calendar was chosen a larger percentage of respondents from the College of Business than from any other college.

Question 4 - “What day of the week would you be most likely to attend a Student Life event?”

Most respondents favored Monday/Tuesday/Wednesday, followed by Friday. Freshman respondents chose Friday more often than Monday/Tuesday/Wednesday, as did respondents from the College of Science and Engineering.

Question 5 - “What time of day would you be most likely to attend a Student Life event?”

The response options for this question were not administered as intended, so the results are not included in this report.

Question 7 - “What is the highest amount you would be willing to pay for a Student Life event (i.e., live music, comedy show, etc.)?”

The highest amount most respondents reported they would be willing to pay for an event was \$5. Most respondents from the College of Education indicated that they would be willing to pay up to \$10. Most female respondents reported that they would be willing to pay up to \$5 while most male respondents reported a willingness to pay up to \$10. Of the respondents indicating a willingness to pay over \$21, 61.4% were male.

Question 8 - “How satisfied are you with Student Life at SF State?”

Most respondents indicated that they are satisfied or somewhat satisfied with Student Life. Freshman respondents appeared to be the most satisfied with Student Life while graduate respondents and those 25 years of age or older appeared to be the most unaware of it.

Question 9 - “How connected are you to your Class Identity (i.e., Class of 2014)?”

Most respondents indicated that they are not connected to their Class Identity. Most freshman respondents indicated that they are somewhat or very connected while more than half of the junior and senior respondents indicated that they are not connected. Graduate respondents appear not to be connected to their Class Identity.

Question 10 - “What is most important to you in defining a sense of community at SF State?”

For most respondents, strong student/faculty/staff relationships appeared to be most important in defining a sense of community at SF State. Smaller percentages of freshman and sophomore respondents and those 24 years of age or younger selected strong student/faculty/staff relationships while larger percentages indicated that Student Life events are most important to them. Nearly two thirds of graduate respondents reported that strong student/faculty/staff relationships are most important in defining a sense of community. Larger percentages of male respondents than female respondents selected athletic events and campus recreation as most important.

Question 12 - “In what physical space on campus do you feel most connected to the SF State community?”

The Cesar Chavez Student Center was selected by the most respondents, including more than half of the respondents in every college, class level, ethnicity category, and age group, as the space where they feel most connected to the SF State community. Of all the respondents selecting the quad/lawn or residence halls (dorms), most were White. Of all the respondents selecting the library annex, most were Asian. A larger percentage of freshman respondents than of other class levels reported that they feel most connected to the SF State community in residence halls (dorms). Male respondents were more likely than female respondents to report feeling most connected in the gymnasium.

Question 13 - “If you were under stress on campus, what would you most likely do for assistance?”

Most respondents indicated that they would talk to a friend if under stress on campus, regardless of gender, age group, ethnicity category, class level, or college. Larger percentages of respondents 25 years of age or older than those 24 years of age or younger reported that they would contact their academic advisor or a professor or the Counseling and Psychological Services Center. Larger percentages of graduate respondents than of other class levels reported that they would contact their academic advisor or a professor. A larger percentage of male respondents than female respondents indicated that they would talk to a parent or family member.

Question 14 - “I believe the new Recreation and Wellness Center should provide a Space for large campus-wide events (i.e., concerts, lectures).”

Most respondents indicated that they agree or strongly agree. Male respondents were more likely than female respondents to express strong agreement. Larger percentages of graduate respondents, respondents 25 years of age or older, and respondents from the College of Education than of other class level, the younger age group, or other colleges indicated that they have no opinion.

Question 15 - “How much are you aware of student events at SF State?”

Most respondents reported that they are minimally or somewhat aware of student events. Awareness appeared to be higher in male respondents, respondents 24 years of age or younger and in lower class levels. Respondents from the College of Education appeared to be the least aware of student events.

Question 16 - “Because of the economic recession, I am working:”

Most respondents indicated that they are working more hours than before. Those for whom the question was not applicable were mostly respondents 24 years of age or younger and freshmen. A larger percentage of Latino respondents and a smaller percentage of Asian respondents than of respondents of other ethnicities reported working more hours than before. A larger percentage of Asian respondents than of respondents of other ethnicities reported that the question was not applicable.

More than half the respondents indicated that they are taking the same number of classes, including nearly two thirds of responding graduate students.

Question 18 - “Because of the economic recession, I am living:”

Overall and within each demographic category, most respondents indicated that they are living in the same place. A smaller percentage of freshman respondents than of other class levels reported moving to less expensive housing.

Question 19 - “Because of the economic recession, the quality of my classes has:”

Most respondents indicated that the quality of their classes has declined somewhat or stayed the same. A larger percentage of freshman respondents than of other class levels indicated that the quality of their classes had stayed the same and a smaller percentage indicated that it had declined a great deal.

Question 20 - “Because of the economic recession, access to my professors has:”

Most respondents indicated that access to their professors has stayed the same. Larger percentages of freshman respondents than of other class levels reported that access has stayed the same or improved.

Question 21 - “Do you own or have ready access to a cell phone with a camera?”

Nearly two thirds of respondents reported owning a cell phone with a camera, followed by more than one quarter reporting that they have ready access to one. Male respondents were more likely than female respondents to report not owning a cell phone or owning one without a camera. Smaller percentages of freshman respondents and respondents 24 years of age or younger reported not owning a cell phone or owning one without a camera.

Question 22 - “Do you own or have ready access to personal computer (laptop or desktop)?”

Nearly two thirds of respondents indicated that they own a computer, and nearly one third reports having ready access to one. A larger percentage of respondents 25 years of age or older reported not owning or having ready access to a computer.

Question 23 - “How did you satisfy, or plan to satisfy, the undergraduate GWAR?”

Respondents were nearly evenly split between taking a GWAR course and taking the JEPET. Few freshmen and sophomores reported having taken a GWAR course or the JEPET. Most freshman respondents indicated that they plan to take a GWAR course, while most sophomores indicated that they plan to take the JEPET. Most responding juniors indicated that they plan to take a GWAR course, and most responding seniors reported that they have taken the JEPET. Most Business respondents indicated that they have taken or plan to take the JEPET, while most Creative Arts respondents reported that they have taken or plan to take a GWAR course.

NOTE: Undergraduates enrolling prior to Fall 2008 typically take the JEPET once they have earned between 48 and 80 credits. Those reaching junior status in or after Fall 2010 choose between the JEPET or a GWAR-designated course. Undergraduate students beginning their studies in or after Fall 2008 satisfy the GWAR in the way designated by their major. Adoption of GWAR courses is ongoing.

Question 24 - “How important do you believe it is to learn to write well as an undergraduate student?”

Most respondents expressed the belief that it is very important to learn to write well as an undergraduate. Male respondents were less likely than female respondents to express the belief that it is very important and more likely to indicate that they believe it is somewhat important or neither important nor unimportant.

Question 25 - “With regard to revision of assignments in upper division work:”

Of the respondents who reported having taken upper division work, most (68.2%) reported having revised at least one assignment. Larger percentages of senior respondents than of other class levels reported having revised at one, two, or three assignments in upper division work. Nearly half (40.6%) of graduate respondents reported that they have revised more than three assignments.
